
Prepare for Winter with Grosafe Garden




Robbie Yortt from Grosafe Garden has some useful tips on when to start your winter pruning and how to apply Grosafe's winter cleanup range.

Pruning Months*



How to prune roses and deciduous fruit trees

- ✓ Ensure tools are sharp. A clean cut avoids 'ragged' stems which invite disease to enter.
- √ Remove any dead or damaged branches first.
- ✓ Aim to create an open 'outward facing' branch system with plenty of space for air movement.
- ✓ For bush roses, select 3 to 5 of the strongest, well-spaced branches to save for the final structure. Remove any that are crossing over or growing towards the centre of the bush.
- ✓ Shorten back the remaining branches by half to two-thirds of their original height. Make cuts just above an outward facing bud at a 45°angle, sloped to direct water away from the bud.



Once the pruning is done it is time to spray for fungal and bacterial disease prevention. Use **FreeFlo® Copper** for fruit trees, roses and ornamentals. It is important to make sure you get a really good coverage so the plant is completely wet with the spray. Apply at leaf fall and repeat every four weeks until bud movement.
